

Founder's Corner

A Model Field Day at the Farm

you may note elsewhere in the Almanac, Friends held an old fashioned field day June 10th, inspired by the description of a field day held 58 years ago at the Farm! Follows excerpts of the article: "The Ladies Shuffle Board Tournament, the first of its kind to be played in Arlington (see photo below!), was won by Mrs. I.M. Sholkin of 80 Grand View road. Mrs. Sholkin, despite having played the game frequently in Florida, had no easy time winning, and played four very close matches before disposing of Miss Lindy Osterlund in her fifth match, in which three games were necessary and the final outcome in doubt all the way. The horseshoe tournament for older boys was won by lanky, leisurely "Andy" Anderson who threw a high percentage of ringers in his final match with Paul McElligott, a dark horse and a coming champion. John Cadeiro won the tournament for boys 14 to 16 years old, but only after several close calls. Donald Kelley, last year's runner-up, carried the honors in the tournament of boys under 14. Donald, much smaller and younger than many of his competitors, found size and age no handicap and lost but a single game during the entire play. The crowd was highly amused by the field events. These included hoop races, potato races, balloon blowing and a snow shoe race. The feature field event was a tug-of-war between a dozen of the

older boys and a group of British and American sailors assisted by a few local men to make up the required number. On the first try the rope parted and the seafarers landed, but not in the manner to which they were accustomed and to the accompaniment of roars from the crowd. On the second try the hawser held and the navy nearly dragged the boys into the Brackett School yard. One of the quieter, but nevertheless popular, features of the day was an exhibit of garden produce and canned goods by the 66 Robbins Farm Victory Gardeners. Many different classes of produce were exhibited and ribbons were awarded for the exhibits judged to be the best. Many of the spectators were surprised to see a chart showing, among other things, that 5,365 pints of various vegetables have been canned by the hard-working Robbins Farmers, who also have many bushels of potatoes and other storable vegetables not shown on the chart. In addition, they have been eating their heads off to consume the things they could not can. Among the notables present were Chairman of the Board of Selectmen Harold Estabrook and Secretary of the Board James Golden, Jr., Police Chief Archie Bullock was a contestant in the men's horseshoe tournament, but was eliminated in the second round by Mac McEllicott. Park Com-missioner Henderson was also eliminated in the second round by

Arthur Paresky. . . . Repre-

sentative Hollis M. Gott was a welcome guest and expressed admiration for the fine work done thus far in furnishing play facilities at the Farm. Board of Health member John Crosby acted as one of the judges of garden produce. One of the most popular of the entire gathering was none other than Nathan Robbins, former owner of the Farm, and a favorite of the children, several generations of them in fact. . . . The days activities wound up with a movie show with the screen set up near the barn. Though as the moon rose the air became chilly the crowd stayed on to the very end and was then reluctant to call it a day.

Town Meeting Addresses Parks and Rec Budget, Community Preservation

This year Town Meeting appropriated \$323,000 to improve Robbins Farm Park.
This approval followed a lengthy process that involved the Town's Park and Recreation Commission, the Town's Finance Committee, the Town's Capital Planning Committee, and the Town's Department of Planning and Community Development.

The Park and Recreation Commission had recommended that the Town appropriate \$1,000,000 to improve Robbins Farm Park over the course of several years. After reviewing all of the Town's capital needs, the Capital Planning Committee's proposal to Town Meeting included \$300,000 that was appropriated this year, and suggested spending an additional \$150,000 in Fiscal Year 2004. In recommending this \$450,000 financial blueprint

to Town Meeting, the Capital Planning Committee noted, "it was supporting the first phase of the project to address the play area which is falling apart and unsafe. The remaining phases of this project are being reviewed." Town Meeting also approved spending \$23,000 in Community Development Block Grant funds to provide for handicap accessibility to the park, including improving pathways and access to play equipment.

Now that Town Meeting has appropriated money to improve Robbins Farm Park, the Park and Recreation Commission will begin the process of deciding how that money will actually be spent. The Friends of Robbins Farm Park will work with the Park and Recreation Commission and other appropriate Town officials and committees as the Town completes its plans to improve the park.

The Community Preservation Act received a somewhat positive start with the creation of a CPA Review Committee at the Annual Town Meeting.

Town Meeting had to deal with big financial hits this year and Town Council John Maher recommended we set up the study committee rather than join up right away. A study committee will keep us in the loop without actually committing too early.

Friends Marc Dohan and Roly Chaput are interested in working on the committee.

Farm Gets a Good Spring Cleaning

Thanks to the many volunteers who helped make our third annual Robbins Farm Clean-up Day a success. Over forty folks from toddlers to seniors spent a few hours raking, shoveling, cleaning, sweeping and spreading throughout several areas of the Farm. Special thanks to Bill Jones, Director of Natural Resources and to Dave, Ron, John and Mike for assisting us with trucks and materials. We could not have accomplished as much without them. We got five loads of new sand for the play area, a load of wood chips and a couple loads of loam which were spread on some troublesome bare spots

along with fifty pounds of grass seed. The town also donated two gallons of green paint for the picnic tables and benches around the play area and the ball field.

Again thanks to all and I know everyone will enjoy Robbins Farm Park that much more because it has had its Spring Cleaning!
