

Come Celebrate—new slides effort to be honored!

Come celebrate the rebuilding of the slides at Robbins Farm Park on May 12. We would like to acknowledge the generosity of the community whose donations helped rebuild the slide. Over \$27,000 was contributed to the town to offset the cost of rebuilding, with extra for a maintenance fund as well. Parks and Rec, FORFP and all of us made it happen! The celebration is at the slides on Saturday afternoon, May 12 at 4:00 p.m. Enjoy cupcakes, music and remarks, a ribbon cutting and a chance for one and all to enjoy the slides. May 19 is the rain date, just in case.

The annual Arlington Patriots' Day Parade will be held on **Sunday April 15**. The parade will start at 2:00 p.m., at Brattle Street and Mass. Ave., and will march east on Mass. Ave. Arlington scouts will be marching with the Save Our Slides Thank You banners—they will be assembling at Mirak around 1:00 p.m.

Check out the latest amenity—a new blue Porta-Potty at the park. This program is supported by the Friends of Robbins Farm.

The Robbins Farm Learning Garden has begun to run a year round program. That means that multi-year plants like asparagus can be grown. Peas, garlic, lettuce, and Jerusalem artichokes are in the ground. The garden is a demonstration project and you may find inspiration for your own garden there, or just enjoy the gardening skills on display by the neighborhood "green thumbs." Participation in the project is by application through the Park and Recreation Commission.

An appreciation of Robbins Farm

Robbins Farm is a special place for many of us here in Arlington, for friends in surrounding towns and for visitors from afar. On several recent days at Robbins Farm, we asked visitors to the park to reflect upon two questions: What does Robbins Farm mean to you? Do you have any special Robbins Farm memories?

Jennifer Jacoby of Arlington reminisced on Robbins Farm as a companion over time: "I remember when I was extremely pregnant with my second daughter. I had taken my first daughter to play and got on the swings myself. I had read on the internet that swinging could help entice an overdue baby. It didn't work, but I will always remember hanging out in the park on that early summer evening watching my toddler play and thinking how much life was going to change when the next baby arrived. Little did I know that I would have another daughter and then a third. Now I go to the park with three girls to play. That's my memory - going from a mom of one playful park-goer to a mom of three playful park-goers. And Robbins Farm witnessed it all."

One recent almost-spring evening, Eddie Wisdom of Arlington emerged from the park toting a ukulele and a broad grin. "I love sitting here playing my ukulele and just enjoying the evening" Wisdom remarked.

Charlie Toulmin of Arlington recalled the stunning spectacle of the recent Jupiter-Venus conjunction he viewed from Robbins Farm. In mid-March, the two bright planets appeared lined up together in the sky, producing a breathtaking sight.

On a Saturday in late March, a young girl named Lila gazed in wonder at two "kite surfers." Leaping into the air at the top of the hill at the Farm, they harnessed the wind power and glided to the bottom.

"Mama," Lila whispered breathlessly, "are they going to fly all the way to Boston?"

On the same day, visitors from Washington, DC admired the gorgeous view. One remarked that the top of the Farm was a perfect place for a planetarium.

Mary Wu of Arlington described searching for a house with her husband and happening upon Robbins Farm: "It was a beautiful day and there were TONS of people at the park...families picnicking, kids playing soccer, people flying kites, the playground was packed. We sat on a bench up at the overlook and both said at nearly the same time 'We want to live near this park.'" Indeed, Robbins Farm is a beloved friend, a treasure of Arlington and a maker of memories.



Wildlife in our park, cont'd.

In just a few hours the other day, there were a number of birds sampling our feeder which has a mixture of tempting seeds including black and striped sunflower, thistle, peanuts, millet, milo and cracked corn. Corn was not popular but several squirrels found it on the ground after the birds tossed it out!

"Who was there?" you say. Certainly the flock of sparrows (usually known as English or House Sparrow). They would fly in all together and surround the feeder in a variety of postures. They were joined by Nuthatches, Titmice, and Chickadees along with ground feeders such as Cardinals, Blue Jays, Juncos, Mourning Doves and an occasional Starling. There was even a Downy Woodpecker who tried the feed holes but shortly went back to a nearby White Oak to dig out worms, hopefully the pesky winter moth!

In addition to these feathered wonders I remember that last summer we had a visiting flock of turkeys. Mona Zeftel reports a wonder of a different sort, at 7:30 am she and other dogwalkers observed deer in our park!
