# FORFP SEEKS FATE OF LONG LOST DOG

The FORFP Board received a Town of Arlington Good Citizen Award on June 27. Awarded by the Selectmen every five years, this award is an honor to FORFP Boards past and present for their good work at the park.

A subcommittee of the Friends of Robbins Farm Park, headed by Roly Chaput, has been conducting a search for the "lost dog" of Robbins Farm. Old-timers remember the dog fondly as a place where kids would sit to get their picture taken.

Last seen in the 1950's, this dog, probably made of bronze or cast iron, is similar to other dogs found in parks – including a famous dog called *The* 

Sentinel in the Roger Williams Park Zoo.

Is our "lost dog" a copy of *The Sentine*l, sculpted by Thomas Frederick Hoppin in 1851? This dog, Black Prince, earned his fame by waking up the sculptor's family to a fire one night in 1849.

The Boston Globe carried a story about Robbins Farm's missing dog on March 14 – no leads have come in, but plenty of research has gone into spotting two dogs in Texas that look similar.

It remains to be seen if a facsimile of our lost dog can be made from the Texas look-alikes, but one can hope that this quest is a success! Send us your thoughts on how to find that dog!

# BILL ARMSTRONG IS GUEST SPEAKER AT ANNUAL MEETING

This past January FORFP held its annual meeting in the community room of Robbins Library. Bill Armstrong, founder of Armstrong Ambulance Company, grew up right by Robbins Farm when it was a farm, and shared his reminiscences with us. He is now 88 years old, so from the time he was 8 until he was 17 it was a farm. He remembers going over to get milk from farmer Robbins for his household! He would sometimes watch him milk his cow, and every once in a while Robbins would squirt someone in the face!

Other boys would gather, and sometimes his crabby wife would come by, and then farmer Robbins would warn all the boys to hide. She would talk, but he would never talk back — he was always silent in her presence. He had chickens and an apple orchard, which was fenced, but the kids would get around that. Bill's most vivid memory was one day witnessing a headless chicken come running around the corner of the barn!! He had no idea! The boys sometimes tried riding the farm horse, but Bill said the horse would find a tree to trot under, and the boys would have to get off quick (or be knocked off). Bill very much appreciated growing up next to a farm, seeing how hard work produced produce and milk, etc., and providing them with a good mentor.
